

INTERCOLLEGIATE FENCERS.

Association Reorganized at Annapolis—
Clarke of Columbia Elected
President.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 10.—Representatives of seven leading colleges met here to-day and reorganized the American Intercollegiate Fencing Association, which for some years has been practically defunct.

The delegates from Harvard, Yale, Cornell, West Point, and Columbia met in New York, where they were joined by a number of members of the New York Fencing Club, who came to Annapolis in an advisory capacity, and the party was tendered the use of the private car of Col. Robert M. Thompson, a graduate of the Naval Academy. At Philadelphia they were joined by the representatives of the University of Pennsylvania. The delegates from the Naval Academy completed the quota. At the meeting to-day the association was revived and a constitution and by-laws were adopted, as well as regulations governing the annual contests. No date was set for the contest.

The full list of delegates was: Harvard—J. P. Parker and T. D. Roberts; Yale—E. H. Delafield and K. Spalding; West Point—Cadets Bull and Ray; University of Pennsylvania—B. Holland and W. L. Knipe; Naval Academy—Cadets R. D. Gatewood and S. C. Rowan; Cornell—B. E. Frick and H. F. Blunt; Columbia—F. B. Clarke and Jean Potler.

Officers were elected as follows: President—F. B. Clarke of Columbia; Vice President—Cadet Ray of West Point; Secretary and Treasurer—J. P. Parker of Harvard.
