

COLLEGE FENCERS MEET FOR TITLES

Army and Navy Competitors
Show Best Form in Cham-
pionship Tournament.

COLUMBIA DOES GOOD WORK

Final Rounds to Decide Team and In-
dividual Honors Will Be Held
This Afternoon.

The Intercollegiate Fencing champion-
ships were begun last evening at the
New York Athletic Club, to be continued
to-day, to decide both the individual and
team championships. By the new plan
adopted yesterday the eight institutions
constituting the league fenced dual
matches in a preliminary round, the win-
ners and losers then meeting, the various
teams being eliminated as they were de-
feated in two team matches. In the first
round the winners were the Army, Navy,
Cornell, and Columbia, the four continu-
ing against each other, and the four
losers, Pennsylvania, Harvard, Princeton,
and Yale, holding secondary bouts.

The superiority of the Army and Navy
fencers was marked over their rivals in
the early bouts, and Pennsylvania and
Harvard were accordingly the first to
meet defeat. Cornell narrowly won out
in her bout with Princeton, and Yale
gave Columbia some trouble before she
was finally disposed of. Columbia, how-
ever, was the only one of the college
teams that looked to have a chance for
the final honors to-day against the
Government schoolboys.

Individually Dickman of the Navy and
Dickinson of the Army were the leaders
of their respective teams. Capt. Brecken-
bridge of Princeton also gave a splendid
exhibition, and went through his early
matches without defeat.

The army by its victory over Cornell
in the second round was the first team
to win the right to play in the final. The
navy was the second team to secure its
position, defeating Columbia. The two
defeated teams will meet this afternoon
to decide which shall meet the winner of
the Pennsylvania-Yale match to be de-
cided then, to determine what team shall
enter the finals with the Government
teams.

Princeton was the first team eliminated,
succumbing to Pennsylvania in the sec-
ond round, her second defeat of the tour-
ney. Harvard was the next to go out,
losing to Yale in a hard-fought match.
This completed the evening's contests.
