## West Point Wins Twenty Bouts

the lead in the ninth annual tournament of the Intercollegiate Fencing Association in the belvedere of the Hotel Astor last night, winning 20 bouts and losing only one in the first night's play at foils. Next to the skillful soldiers the Cornell fencing team showed best with 15 victories and 6 defeats. These two teams, which will probably figure in the final tussle for the championship, had but three bouts against each other last night. and the Army was victorious in all of them. The tournament includes a round robin

of 135 bouts, and 63 of them were fenced last night. The tournament will continue this afternoon and the finals will fenced in the grand ballroom of the Astor to-morrow night and will be followed by the association's annual ball. Larimer was defeated for the individual championship last year in an extra time bout by Roos of Cornell after the two had tied in the tournament. The Cornell team, present holders of the championship, are not out of the running by any means, and their work last night was very promising to their supporters in the gallery.
