CLARKE CLINCHES 1924 SABRE TITLE

West Point Fencer Wins Individual Championship in Intercollegiate Meet.

VICTOR TAKES SIX BOUTS

Meets Only Defeat at Hands Ogilvie of Hamilton—Navy Assured of Epee Team Honors.

The intercollegiate fencing championships, with all three weapons, sable, foils and épeé, started yesterday at the Hotel Astor, and before any of the events had been concluded one individual and one team title had been clinched, while another team and another individual championship were practically decided. In the individual sabre competition, for which eight men qualified through their victories scored in dual meets throughout the season, Cadet Francis Clarke of the United States Military Academy swept through his seven bouts with six victories and only one defeat, securing for him the 1924 title. In the épeé contests Midshipmen Calloway and Fletcher, representing the United States Naval Academy, won twelve of their bouts, losing only two, and with only two more to fence, clinched the crown for the navy. Calloway also practically clinched the individual épeé championship, although it is possible for him to be tied should he lose his one remaining bout against Brown of Yale tonight, while Thomson of the University of Pennsylvania, the

Army Takes Lead.

The army took a substantial lead in the bouts for the sabre team championship, the combination of Clarke and Moore turning in seven victories against three defeats, with only two more bouts to fence, while the army's nearest competitor is its ancient foe from Annapolis, with seven bouts won, four lost and one to fence. Obviously, if the arm y loses both of its bouts tonight while the navy wins its one remaining contest, the midshipmen will carry off the honors. Clarke's precomances in clinching the

individual sabre championship was the outstanding work of the day. The big cadet from West Point gave the appearance while off the mat of being a bit too cumbersome to handle the weapon with the delicacy necessary to win matches against strong competition, but once his rubber-soled shoes started taptapping on the mat he became the picture of agility and gracefulness. He parried and thrust with equal confidence and his handling of the sabre was brilliant. The timing of his attacks was little short of perfection and showed that the big fellow had a mathematical knowledge of just how far he could trust his legs and arm to reach when he lunged forward with an offensive move-: ment. Neither Hastings, Moore, his team-mate, nor Bell gave him much competi-

tion in his first three bouts, but when ne faced Huntington, captain of the Yale combination and a master with the sword. Clarke was pressed to win. The blue-clad star from New Haven took a commanding lead of 3-1 before Clarke came into his own. Then confidence returned and three times in a row he evaded the protecting blade of Huntington's sabre and broke through to score, taking the lead at 4-3. The next point went to the Yale swordsman, however, with a splendidly executed attack, and the points were even, with the next to decide the match. Clarke did not hesitate for a minute on the defensive, but carried the attack down the mat, cutting and thrusting with a ferociousness that might have forced a less sturdy opponent to yield, but the Yale leader met thrust with counterthrust and cut with Tense seconds passed before parry. either man could break through the other's guard, but finally, with a lightninglike turn of the wrist, Clarke swept his blade under and around the other's guard and scored to win the bout.
