TEAM TITLES SWEPT BY YALE FENCERS

Blue Adds Sabre and Foils Honors to Epee Crown on the Final Day at Hotel Astor.

TWO MIDSHIPMEN SCORE

Eskilson Beats Mayo of the Army for Sabre Laurels—Bennett Is Epec Champion.

The wielders of the blue blade made a clean sweep of the intercollegiate team fencing championships in the final bouts at the Hotel Astor yesterday afternoon and last night. Having won the epee title during the first day of competition on Thursday, Yale's swordsmen yesterday carried off the historic Iron Man, presented by Colonel Robert M. Thompson and emblematic of the team foil championship, and also the sabre title.

The duelists from New Haven, ecached by Robert Grasson, went through the foils matches without a defeat and, except for two ties, one by the Army and one by the Navy, won all their matches with the sabre. Elwell, Every and Brown carried the team through victoriously with the foil, while Wolfe and Huffman were responsible for bringing the sabre title to the sons of Eli. Brown, teamed with Snow, also had a hand in capturing the épée honors.

Representatives of the United States Naval Academy took two individual championships, Midshipman Eskil T. Eskilson winning the individual honors with the sabre and Midshipman Bennett taking the épée title. Eskilson had practically clinched the sabre crown on Thursday, when he won seven bouts without a defeat to mar his record, but he still had to face Mayo of the Army.

Mayo Had Chance to Tie.

Mayo had been defeated by Bookler of Penn and the best he could hope to gain was a tie with the lean, blond-haired swordsman from Annapolis, but at least that would have given him a chance in the fence-off.

This match between representatives of the rival service schools was one of the most interesting of the championships. The score reached 4—4, with the title hanging on the result of one lone touch. Up and down the rubber strip they padded, thrusting and parrying, eager to score and just as eager to prevent being scored against. Then, suddenly, Eskilson's blade shot forward and found a resting place on the white tunic of his opponent, giving him the championship.

Mayo finished second and Huffman of Yale was third.

The only title that wasn't carried off by a Yale team or a swordsman from the Navy was the individual foil championship which was won by Joseph Levis of M. I. T. In a field that included fourteen duellists from eight universities, Levis came through supreme, scoring eleven victories against only two defeats. Ellison of the Navy and Every of Yale finished in a tie for second place and Every repeated an

earlier victory in the fence-off, gaining

the verdict by five touches to two.

The Navy sabre team had a chance of tying Yale for the championship with that weapon providing it won its last two matches, the first against Columbia and the second against the Army. But the best it could get in either was a tie, and so it had to be content with second place, holding that position only by a matter of points, as the Navy's record of two victories, no defeats and three ties was equaled by the Army, which was relegated to third place because of the points scored against it.

hung in the balance of the Yale-Harvard match, each having won all its four bouts when these two old rivals met. But Cetrulio was the only Harvard swordsman who was able to score over an opponent from New Haven, and when Every defeated all three of Harvard's representatives, the Crimson's last chance faded. Yale won the match by 5 to 3, pushing Harvard into second place, with the Navy getting third, again on points.

The matches were run off with greater celerity and less confusion than ever before. In past years the final night of competition has found the standing of the teams and the prowess of the individuals in such a mixed-up state that no one seemed to know just what was going on or why.

But this year the épée titles, both team and individual, were cleaned up on Thursday, leaving the field clear for the foilsmen and sabre contestants. The sabre bouts were decided yesterday afternoon, and last night the foils were completed without a hitch, and the crowd that assembled in the grand ballroom of the Hotel Astor was able to see just enough good fencing to appreciate the art and to get to its dancing early.
