Swordsmen from Yale University and the Army team from the United State Military Academy divided honors as the intercollegiate fencing tournament began yesterday at the Hotel Astor. Yale won the saher team championship and tied for the épée championship with the Army, only to be turned back in a fenceoff which retained for the cadets bur. the title they so gallantly won last year. The Yale saber team succeeds Columbia as titleholder.

The possibility existed at midnight last night that Yale might be deprived of the saber championship due to technicalities in the method of scoring. More than six hours after the announcement had been made that the New Haven team had won the title a committee of five was appointed to check over the bouts on the basis of touches and in light of the Olympic scoring system.

The committee consists of Lieutenant George C. Calnan, Colonel Henry Breckinridge, F. Barnard O'Connor, A. P. Walker Jr. and Lieutenant C. They will decide today E. Byers. whether Yale will keep the title, whether another team should have it or whether fence-offs are necessary.

An attempt was made to reach a decision in the team foils championship, and competition was carried on until almost midnight. But so hotly contested were the bouts that the men became exhausted and an adjournment was taken until this afternoon. The team foils championships carried with it the famous from Man presented by Colonel Robert M. Thompson, and Yale and Army were in the forefront of the battle for its possession. A large gallery witnessed thrilling

competition yesterday afternoon and evening, and renewed interest is expected today when the individual championships will be decided, culminating with the three-weapon championship and the intercollegiate dance tonight. New Trophy Is Donated.

It developed in the course of the

afternoon that the Iron Man trophy cock. has a rival, for it was announced that alumni and members of the intercollegiate association have donated a new trophy for the threeweapon championship. It is crossed blades and a mask on a pedestal, the whole about three feet high and will be formally presented this morning. Yale, defending three-weapon champion, will strive valiantly to retain

its honors, for the Blue team has won three times since the institution of the three-weapon championship in 1923. Army won the first time and Navy the second. In 1925 Navy and Yale tied. Then Yale, Army and Yale won in 1926, 1927 and 1928, respectively. On the strength of the performances yesterday afternoon and Army will again fight it out for 5-2. the three-weapon title. Anthony Hyde and Gilbert Ward of Yale were the men to make safe

the saber championship, winning three bouts, tying one and losing one for a total of three and a hall points. Columbia and Navy were tied for second in the point standing with three points each, but the New Yorkers won three and lost two while the midshipmen won two, tiec two and lost one. N. Y. U. and Army tied for fourth place and Dartmouth was last. With the duelling sword, the vic-

torious Army team was composed of Cadets C. J. Sands and P. C. Wehle Yale's team, which tied for the first honors only to be defeated in the fence-off, was made up of F. S Righeimer and E. L. Hill. Army and Yale each won four and lost one ir the regular competition, but Army defeated Yale, 3 to 1, in the fence off. Hyde a Leader in Sabers.
