Board Should Expand Slowly for Best Interests of All, **Executive Director Says** 

A blanket denial that any tie-up between the Intercollegiate Fencing Association and the Central Office for Eastern Intercollegiate Athletics would result in the "freezing out" of N. Y. U., C. C. N. Y. or any other colleges was made yesterday by Asa S. Bushnell, executive director of the Central Office.

This was contained in a formal statement in which Mr. Bushnell took cognizance of reports that the college fencing group was faced with a crisis whereby it would join the Eastern group with a resultant breaking up of the association as it

now stands.

The executive director pointed out that the fencers had not made any application for membership. also stated that he could not foretell how the executive council of the Central board would receive such an application, since his office "is fully occupied just now with the affairs charter of its member groups and should be expanded slowly if the interests of all concerned are to be best served."
