N.Y.U.SQUADGAINS 5 FENCING CROWNS

Violet Takes 3-Weapon Honors as Giolito Stars—Army and Princeton Annex Titles

New York University's team atlined fencing glory last night in

tained fencing glory last night in the forty-seventh annual intercollegiate championship by winning five of the seven titles at stake. Through the long years of com-

petition in this sport few colleges have compiled a record equal to that completed by the Violet fencers in a stirring round robin that brought the two-day competition to a close at the N. Y. U. School of Education gymnasium.

No team in modern history has been able to snare all three indi-

vidual crowns with the épée, foil and saber in one tournament, but N. Y. U. did it last night with three southpaw fencers, to the jubilation of the cheering supporters of the team and the gratification of its veteran coach, Julio Castello.

Not only did the Violet squad regain the three-weapon team trophy

that went to Navy a year ago after a four-year domination by the New Yorkers, but it captured the foil team crown as well.

The individuals who distinguished themselves for the Violet were led by Captain Silvio Giolito, who went through his entire program of 18

bouts undefeated and carried off the foil championship as a result.

Tauber Gains Two Finals

Arthur Tauber, a sophomore and a former freshman intercollegiate ace, proved his versatility by qual-

ifying for both the foil and épée finals. This alone was a distinctive

feat, but Tauber went on to take

the épée crown and finished third

with the foil.

N. Y. U.'s other champion proved to be Franklin Scharfstein, saber fencer. Facing stern opposition in this division, in which Abe Campo of Navy was the only defending champion in the tourney, Scharfstein won seventeen of his eighteen bouts, Campo finishing third.

Navy, which had won the three-weapon, foil and épée honors a year ago, went back home empty-handed. Princeton accounted for a major upset in annexing the épée team championship for the first time in a rather dramatic finish with N. Y. U. The Tigers won by 29½ points to 28½ for the Violet and 26½ for Navy.

During a bout with Pete Glennon of Navy, Princeton's No. 2 épée man, Emile Rimbault Jr. slipped and turned his ankle. After time out he came back, but Glennon, who had led, 2 to 0, before the mishap, captured the bout. As matters turned out, however, it was Rimbault who beat Cole of City College in the test that gave the Princetonians victory. After that Rimbault still had another bout to fence, but he decided to let it go by default to Tauber of N. Y. U., since the team victory was clinched. Margin is 10 Points

Three-weapon honors went to N. Y. U. on a final point total of 83½. Navy scored 73½. Columbia 48

Navy scored 73½, Columbia 48, Army 47, City College 42½, M. I. T. 41½, Princeton 39½, and Cornell 33½.

Army emerged with the saber team championship, replacing its

team championship, replacing its service rival as titleholder. Alan Strock of the cadet squad finished second to Scharfstein of N. Y. U. in the individual race and aided in the team's winning aggregate of 32, the midshipmen placing next with 23 and Columbia third with

Alan Rorick of Army, who was second in last year's final to Campo of Navy, tied Campo this time for third place, the midshipman gaining his place on touches.


