individual championship.

The Little Iron Man trophy went to Penn on its superior showing with the foil. It marked a new era in fencing for the Quakers. Despite the fact that the competition had been held since 1894, this was the first time that Penn won it.

A great deal of the credit went to Lajos Csiszar, Penn's coach, who assumed his job five years ago after many years of teaching in Budapest under Italo Santelli.

This morning's triumph matched the épée team's initial victory yesterday. And the foil fencers followed the example of their épée performers, for one of them came through with a sweep, winning all eleven bouts. This was Bob Goldman, 20-year-old former fencing captain at Brooklyn's Erasmus Hall High School. Yesterday it was John Tori who went through the épée field unbeaten for Penn.

As a result of Goldman's 11 points, one for each bout, Penn had a team tally of 24, just one ahead of Cornell. The Ithacans, who had beaten Penn during the round robin matches, 2-1, lost to City College, the tailenders.

It was Penn's closing rush that did it. The Quakers beat their last three rivals, City College, winner of the title last year; N. Y. U., and Yale, all with 3—0 scores, to overtake Cornell and Columbia, who had been tied at that stage with 16 to Penn's 15.

Aid With Seven Points

In the foil trio for Penn with Goldman were Captain Francis Bartone, the No. 1 man, and Achilles Nickles of Trenton. Each accounted for seven points.

Columbia and Brooklyn College, with 21, each finished in back of Penn and Cornell. Navy and N. Y. U. followed with 20 each. Princeton tallied 16. Rutgers and Yale 14 each, Army 12, Harvard 7 and City College 6.

Bartone fenced against Walter Rubinstein of Columbia and Phillipe Mocquard of Cornell, Frenchborn ace, to qualify. The fence-off ended in a deadlock and the tie was decided by counting the number of touches that had been registered against each contestant during the round-robin and the fence-off. Bartone had thirty-eight charged against him, Mocquard had forty-six and Rubinstein fortynine.

Wallner Keeps Epée Title

Wallner kept his individual épée championship by sweeping five bouts. The 6-foot-6 N. Y. U. junior had two close tests, one against John Tori, the Penn star who was undefeated in the team bouts yesterday. Tori led Wallner, 2-0, before the New Yorker registered three touches in succession. Phillip Vollman of Army was

second while Tori accounted for third place after a tie, the Perfencer being charged with ten touches, while Walter Brackelmanns of Rutgers and Don Loring of Navy had 11 and 12 against them, respectively. All three had won two bouts.

Brooklyn College rooters gained considerable satisfaction in the performance of Nober, their 19year-old No. 1 foil representative, who was second in the 1952 N.C. A. A. championship. Nober not only defeated each of his five opponents for the individual crown but finished with only three touches last two seasons as a guest. 21-year-old Penn .Parmacek.
