N. Y. U. Dominates Title Fencing Here

Cutting an impressive swath in the Intercollegiate Fencing Association championships, New York University yesterday took three-weapon honors and tied for the saber team crown.


This gave the Violets a virtual grand slam in the two-day tournament. They had captured both the épée and foil team titles at the Concourse Plaza on Friday.

Their bid for a sweep failed by the slim margin of one bout. But their 21 points in the saber round-robin, which tied Columbia, enabled them to equal the high mark for this 64-year-old competition. In 1954, Columbia also snared three titles and tied for a fourth.

After Coach Hugo Castello saw the Violets' point total of 71 posted on the scoring board, assuring the three-weapon honors. he commented:

father, Julio, taught the sport there for twenty-one years. Hugo was on the N. Y. U. team from 1935 to 1938. Columbia placed second in the three-weapon standing, with 58 points. Third in the eleven-college field was Penn, with 54.

After that, the order was Cornell with 53, Navy 49, Princeton 46, Yale 42, City College 42, Harvard 39, Rutgers 28 and Brooklyn College 11. The bid for saber team laurels was so close that the outcome hinged on the eleventh and last round. N. Y. U., facing Navy, won two of three matches.

Columbia, fencing on an adjoining strip against City College, needed a sweep of its three remaining bouts to tie N. Y. U. Schwartz Aids Lions Alan Schwartz, the team captain, Bart Nisonson and Stephen Certrulo provided the Lion victories. Certrulo, a sophomore, is a

member of a fencing family. His father, Guido, was a national collegiate foil and saber champion at the University of Alabama. His grandfather, Gerardo,

was a world professional champion in Italy. An uncle, Dean, is a former national foil and saber champion. Navy was in the running until meeting N. Y. U. The middies finished with 20 points in the saber. Yale and Penn each had 17, and Cornell and Harvard each had 16. N. Y. U.'s saber trio consisted

of Israel Colon, who won eight in the first pool; Alex Kosicharow, who captured seven in
