# N. Y. U. Wins in Foils, Penn in Epee

A few hours after relinquishing the épée crown to Penn yesterday, New York University won the foils title in the Intercollegiate Fencing Association championships.

At home in their Alumni Gymnasium at University Heights, a new scene for the sixty-five-year-old tourney, the Violets moved ahead in the overall race for three-weapon supremacy. Losing only two foils bouts in twenty-seven, Hugo Castello's Violets gained 25 points to add to the 17 they had picked up in the épée. N. Y. U. has held the three-weapon title for the past five years.

Against N. Y. U.'s aggregate of 42 points, Columbia, the Ivy League champion, has 38. Princeton is third with 32.

The saber competition will be held today.

## Penn Scores Upset

The big surprise in twelve hours of fencing came in the épée round-robin, which Penn won for the first time since 1953. The Quakers scored 18 points in the épée to 17 apiece for Columbia and N. Y. U. Navy was fourth with 16 points.

The midshipmen, after a poor start, closed with a rush. Their concluding bout against the defenders from N. Y. U. resulted in a 3-0 Navy victory.

N. Y. U. had gone into the final épée round leading the ten competing colleges with 17 points. One victory against Navy would have brought the Violets a tie with Penn, two would have meant an outright victory.

Lajos Csiszar, a native of Budapest, Hungary, who took over the Penn squad in 1948, commented: "Maybe we should give Navy a piece of our championship cake." It was the second triumph in this weapon for Penn under Csiszar. He attributed part of the Quakers' suc-

N. Y. U.'s two defeats in the foils came in the opening and closing matches. The first victim was Herb Cohen, the National Collegiate three-weapon and foils titleholder. The N. Y. U. senior has a 62-1 won-lost record in three years of dual meets. When he bowed to Dick Rothenberg of Columbia last night, 5-4, it was his first setback this season and ended a fifty-bout winning streak.

foils trio qualified for the individual final. Cohen, whose 8-1 performance was equaled by Vito Mannino of City College, qualified along with his teammates, Marv Grafton and Cetrulo.

Grafton was the only undefeated competitor, scoring nine straight victories in Pool 2. Other foils qualifiers were Rothenberg and Jay Lustig of Columbia.

Fourth in the three-weapon team standing at the end of the first day was Penn with 30 points. Navy was next with 27. Then came Yale with 24, Cornell 23, C. C. N. Y. 22, Rutgers 21 and Harvard 11.
