

Penn Sweeps Foil and Epee Honors in Title Fencing Here

COLUMBIA TRAILS IN 3-WEAPON RACE

Penn Leads, 52-46, in 2-Day
Meet—Navy and N.Y.U.
Tied With 40 Points

The University of Pennsylvania's fencing team scored a double-edged triumph in the Intercollegiate Fencing Association championships yesterday as the Quakers swept both the epee and foil titles at the Columbia University gymnasium.

The sweep in the opening phases of the two-day meet, of course, propelled the Pennsylvanians into the lead for the three-weapon crown. The saber bouts will conclude the championships this afternoon.

The Quakers, coached by a former Hungarian fencing master, Lajos Csiszar, won 28 of 33 bouts to gain foil honors. They captured the epee title with 24 points.

As a result, Penn held a satisfactory 6-point margin in the three-weapon race with 52 points, Columbia, the Ivy League champion and unbeaten in dual meets this season, was second with 46. Navy and New York University were tied for third with 40 points each. City College was fifth with 37.

Penn had not won with the foil since 1953. Its previous success with the epee came in this 68-year-old tournament in 1962.

Steve Permut, a 5-foot-6-inch 118-pounder, and another sophomore, Russ Goodman, each won 10 of 11 foils bouts.

Penn's team triumphed with the epee after a down-to-the-wire battle against City College. In the 11th round that ended a five-hour session, John McMahon clinched the honors for the Quakers.

Opposing City's No. 1 man, Bob Chernick, McMahon won to bring Penn its 24th point. His two teammates, Steve Netburn and Jay Miller, eased off after that, but their losses to City mattered little: The New York team finished with 22 points.

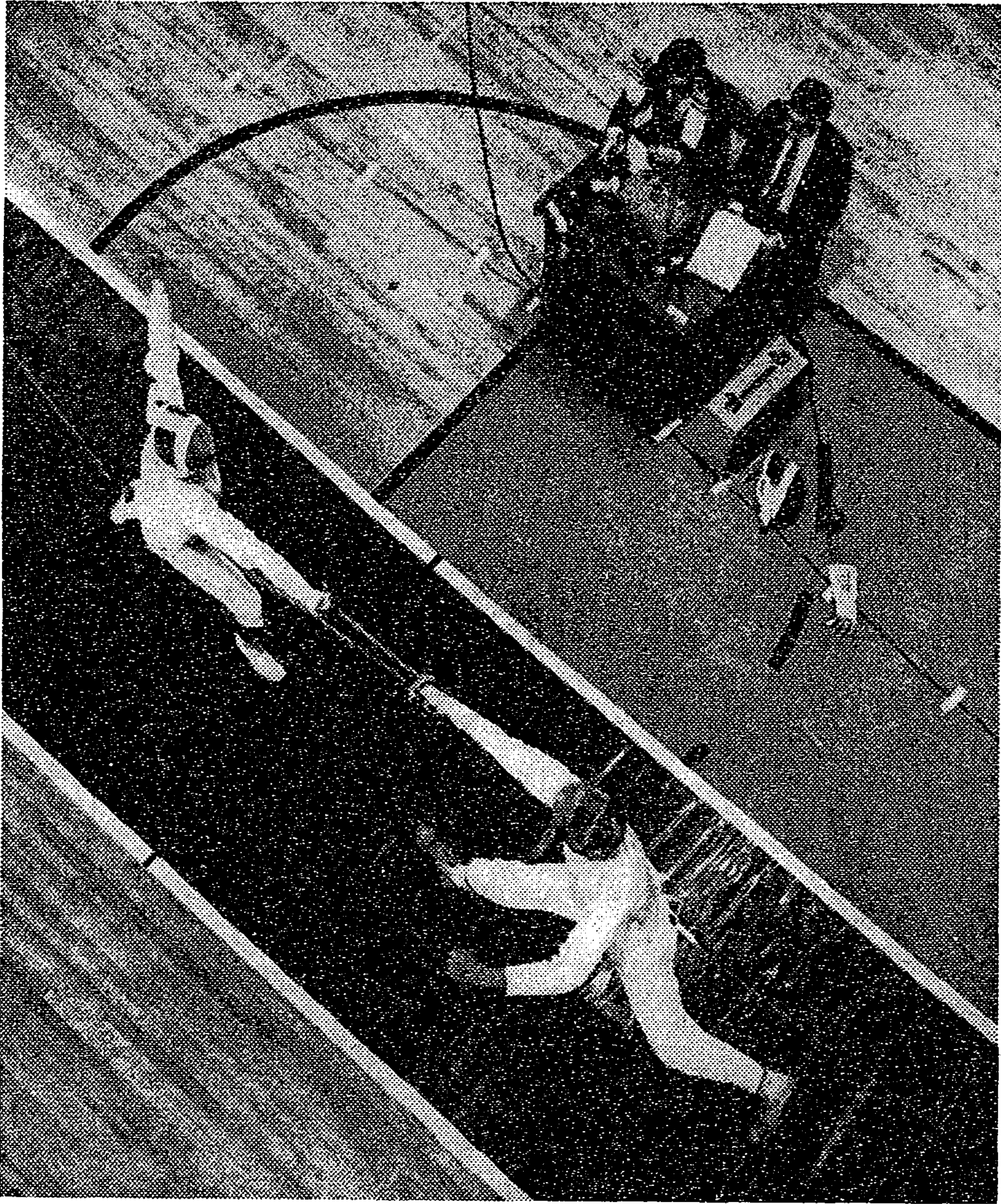
