

Cornell, Penn and Lock Haven Win National College Crowns

For the first time in 13 years, an Eastern team reigns as national collegiate hockey champion. Cornell, by defeating Boston University, 4-1, in the final of the National Collegiate Athletic Association tournament at Syracuse Saturday night, joined Boston College (1949) and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (1954) as the only Eastern teams that have won the tournament since its inception in 1948.

The all-Eastern final — the first in the history of the event — attracted a standing-room-only crowd of 6,571 to the Onondaga County War Memorial auditorium. Cornell, in running its season record to 27 victories, 1 loss and 1 tie, demonstrated its pre-eminence conclusively.

Tenacious checking, clever stickwork, precise passing and abundant hustle marked Cornell's play. Goals by Bob Kinasewich, Walt Stanowski, Doug Ferguson and Bob McGuinn were more than enough to settle the issue.

Goalle Sets Record

Ken Dryden, the Big Red goalie, turned back 44 of 45 shots on goal by the Terriers. Only Mike Sobeski's shot midway in the second period eluded Dryden who, with the stiff Cornell defense, set a record for fewest goals allowed in the semi-final and final games—one. Cornell had blanked Michigan State, 1-0, in the semi-final.

In the consolation final, Michigan State defeated North Dakota, 6-1.

A remarkable performance in the saber competition by Todd Mahler, Daniel Cohen and Norman Stillman netted 24 of a possible 27 points and lifted the University of Pennsylvania to its first championship in the 45-year-old Intercollegiate Fencing Association tournament at Cambridge, Mass.

The results in the saber gave Penn 57 points in the three-weapon standing, one more than New York University and two more than Columbia, the pre-tournament favorites.

N. Y. U. Fencers Win Titles

In individual competition N. Y. U. fencers won all three events. Paul Apostol in the saber, George Masin in the épée and Mike Gaylor in the foil captured titles.

Lock Haven State College successfully defended its title in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletic wrestling tournament at Lock Haven, Pa. Lock Haven's 80-point total, achieved with one individual title and four defeats in the final round, was 11 ahead of second-place Adams State of Colorado.

Randy Matson of Texas A. and M. broke the N. C. A. A. discus record with a toss of 200 feet 7½ inches in a triangular meet at College Station, Tex. He bettered his own record of 199 feet 7½ inches.

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
