

# Navy Wins Epee Team Honors; Princeton Triumphs With Foil

Navy's team cleared the decks in a final bid for the intercollegiate fencing three-weapon championship by taking a slim lead against 12 challenging squads last night in the 72-year-old tournament.

The midshipmen had 53 points at the conclusion of the épée and foil competitions that were decided at New York University's Alumni Gymnasium at University Heights in the Bronx.

After winning the épée team honors outright, the midshipmen finished third in the foil bouts and gained a point edge over all in the two-weapon standing.

N.Y.U. and Princeton tied for second with 52 points. Penn was fourth with 44, followed by Columbia with 42 and Cornell with 41.

Princeton contributed the surprise of the two-day meet, by winning the "Little Iron Man," celebrated among intercollegiate trophies and symbolic of foil supremacy. It was the first time the Tigers had won the foil since the competition started.

Princeton scored 30 points, beating N.Y.U. by one point. Navy was third with 26 victories in its 36 bouts.

The highlight of the evening came in the last of the 216 foil bouts. Navy, Princeton and N. Y. U. were deadlocked with 52 points in the three-weapon standing. But then an 18-year-old sophomore from Annapolis, Charles Collier, who learned to fence in the Baltimore Y.M.C.A. before entering the Naval Academy, scored the decisive touch against Rick Webber of Princeton to give Navy its 53d point.

John Nonna, a 20-year-old Princeton junior from the Bronx, was undefeated in the foil competition with 12 victories.

Navy dislodged N.Y.U., last year's victor, by taking the épée team honors with 27 winning bouts. The Navy captain, Jim Davidson, fencing in the No. 1 épée spot, accounted for 10 victories.
