YALE TEAM GAINS LEAD IN FENCING

Paces Columbia at N.C.A.A. Meet-N.Y.U., Defender, Is Seventh in Standing

LUBBOCK, Tex., March 21 (AP)—Yale took a 32-30 lead over Columbia as the National Collegiate fencing championships began today.

The defending champion, New York University, was seventh 21 points. with Other team scores were Illinois 29, Navy 27, Wisconsin 25, Wayne State 22, Detroit and Iowa tied at 19 and Buffalo and Notre Danle at 18

each. Bruce Davis of Wayne State the only defending individual champion in the meet, gained ten foil victories without a loss. However, he still must meet John Norton of Yale, who finished fourth last year and has a 11-1 record in the round-robin competition this year.

Leading in the épée event were Steve Buchman, Columbia; Jay Powell, Yale, and R. R. Womack, Navy, all with 10 triumphs.

Pacing the sabre competition were Art Schankin, Illinois, and Frank Parisi, Colum**8**ia, with thirteen successes each Schankin is unbeaten. Parisi has one loss, to James Reese of Yale, who is third with an 11-3 wonlost mark. Irving DeKoff, the Columbia
