

Navy's Swordsmen In N.C.A.A. Sweep

ANNAPOLIS, Md., March 28 —Navy's fencers registered a sweep of three individual titles in winning the National Collegiate team championship today.

The midshipmen ended the two-day round-robin with a total of 72 winning bouts in foil, épée and saber and only four losses.

They had a perfect performance this morning in twenty-three bouts in all three weapons. Their only setbacks came yesterday, when they dropped four and won forty-nine.

The strong New York University trio, which emerged with only two defeats in forty-

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nine bouts yesterday, finished in the runner-up spot with 65 points. The Violets failed in their title quest by bowing in nine of twenty-seven today. They lost three bouts to Navy.

King Hussein of Jordan visited the United States Naval Academy. He was scheduled to watch the tourney in the field house, but a change in plans prevented him from seeing representatives of twenty-nine colleges compete with enthusiasm.

This was the first time in the fifteen-year history of the tournament that all three individual titles went to members of the champion team.

Roland Wommack's success in retaining the épée title was another "first" in National Collegiate fencing history. Wommack, who is 22 years old and lives in Philadelphia, went through the round-robin with a 24-2 record.

Subsequently he was voted the "fencer of the year" by a ballot of participants in the championship. The award to Wommack, which carried with it the Illinois Memorial Trophy, is based on sportsmanship and conduct in championships and in over-all collegiate competition.

Navy's day was complete when the officials announced that André R. Deladrier of Navy had been named by all coaches as "coach of the year."

Al Morales of Tucson, Ariz., in the saber and Joe Paletta of New Rochelle, N. Y., in the foil were the other members of this victorious Navy aggregation.

Navy also carried off this championship in 1950.

Paletta had a rough assignment in the foil. He finished with only one defeat in twenty-six bouts. The loss occurred yesterday, when he lost to Dave Micahnik of Penn. His big test came this morning against Gene Glazer of N. Y. U., who had beaten him in the Eastern title meet in a fence-off two weeks ago.

Glazer, ranked third nationally, is 19 and a sophomore. He had won nineteen in a row until he met Paletta, 21. The midshipman, a junior here who had fenced at N. Y. U. before transferring to the Naval Academy, captured a close decision, 5-4 from Glazer. The N. Y. U. ace later bowed to Ben Janowski of Columbia.

Morales, also 21, attended Yale for one year. He won the saber title with a 23-1 mark. Morales encountered his setback yesterday, when he lost to Sanford Scher of Buffalo. Morales won his seven bouts today, and Wommack took his eighth.

N. Y. U.'s scoreboard consisted of a 24-2 record for Glazer, a 20-6 mark by Chris Pascal in the épée and a 21-3 showing by Mike Dasaro in the saber.

The Violets started slowly, losing a saber and épée bout to Penn before meeting Navy. The 3-0 verdict for Navy was followed later by a 3-0 decision by Columbia over N. Y. U., with Janowski administering Glazer's second foil defeat of the tourney. Davey Kennedy of Illinois subsequently turned back Pascal in the épée.

Columbia was third in the team race with 63 points. Then came Penn and Illinois, the 1958 winner, each with 56. Wayne State followed with 54. Then came Wisconsin, with 51; Notre Dame, 47, and Princeton, 46. Yale was tenth at 43.

Paletta's triumph automatically earned him a place on the Olympic fencing squad. Morales and Wommack already had gained berths on the squad.
