ANNAPOLIS, Md., March 28—Navy's fencers registered a sweep of three individual titles in winning the National Collegiate team championship today.

The midshipmen ended the two-day round-robin with a total of 72 winning bouts in foil, épée and saber and only four losses.

They had a perfect performance this morning in twenty-three bouts in all three weapons. Their only setbacks came yesterday, when they dropped four and won fortynine.

The strong New York University trio, which emerged with only two defeats in forty-
