# Win N.C.A.A. Epee, Saber, Foil and Team Crowns

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., April 2—Favored New York University won the National Collegiate fencing title tonight, rolling up 65 points to defeat the defending champions from Navy, who finished second with 57.

N. Y. U. fencers also grabbed all three individual champion-ships, scoring only the second such sweep in history. Navy accomplished the feat last year.

Gene Glazer won the foils title with a 24-2 record, Gil Eisner was tops in épée with 20-3 and Mike Dasaro captured the saber title with 21-3.

Dasaro edged the only returning Navy champion of last year, Al Morales, who finished the meet with 20-4.

Princeton finished in third place with 50 points, followed by Wayne State with 47, Columbia 46, City College of New York 45 and Notre Dame 44.

Dasaro, the runner-up to Morales last year, lost to Warren Danzer of Illinois, Ted DeBaene of Notre Dame and Bob Blackburn of Stevens. This year, Morales was among his twenty-one victims.

Glazer, also a runner-up in his division last year, did not have to contend with Navy's Joe Palatta, who graduated and was not around to defend his title. Glazer was defeated by Tom Vincent of Iowa and John Vapurso of Rochester.

Eisner, making his first appearance in N. C. A. A. competition, lost to Alonzo Johnson of C. C. N. Y., Frank Tuerkheimer of Columbia and Jerry Old of Kansas

N. Y. U. was expected to win with ease, but Navy came up with surprising strength after losing two of its three champions. However, even if Morales had won the saber championship, N. Y. U. would still have won the meet.
