NAVY GAINS LEAD IN TITLE FENCING

Middies 3 Points Ahead of N.Y.U. in N.C.A.A. Meet

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Saturday, March 31 (AP)—Navy surprised the defending champion, New York University, and took the lead after the first day of the two-day National Collegiate fencing championship.

Earlier Friday evening it was believed that the N.Y.U. team, with three defending individual champions back, was on its way to a third straight N.C.A.A. crown.

A late start and a deluge of results tossed the point tabulation far behind, but when all of the results were tabulated the middles held a 49-46 lead over N.Y.U.

Leading the Navy drive for the title were Thane Hawkins, first-day leader in the épée event with an 18-1 record, and Edward Hurst, who topped the laber competition with a 16-1 mark.

Herb Cohen of N.Y.U., who has won fifty dual meets this season, led the foil competition with a 17-1 mark.

Other teams in the top ten of the field of thirty-six are illinois, with thirty-eight victories to its credit; Pennsylvania thirty-seven; Columbia, thirty-four; Ohio State, thirty-three; Princeton, 32; Air Force, thirty-two; Cornell, 31, and Michigan State, 31.

The championship is a roundrobin affair, with all fencers
meeting everyone in their particular event. By the time the
championship is decided the foil
men will have fought about thirty-three duels, épee specialists
thirty-two and saber men thirty-one. The number of bouts
varies because some school did
not enter a full three-man team.
