

COLUMBIA SECOND FOR TEAM CROWN

Trails Violets by 8 Points —Walter Krause, Soriano, Nadas Capture Titles

SOUTH BEND, Ind., March 21—Displaying superior strength in each of the three weapons, New York University captured a record eighth National Collegiate Athletic Association fencing championship today at the Notre Dame Athletic and Convocation Center.

For the Violets, Walter Krause won the individual foil crown by taking 21 of 23 bouts in the final round; his brother, Wayne Krause, placed second in épée and Jeff Tishman finished third in saber.

It was a superb season for N.Y.U., coached by Hugo Castello, who completed his 23rd year. The Violets swept through 10 dual matches undefeated and followed that with their 17th Intercollegiate Fencing Association title last weekend at Cambridge, Mass.

Comment From Coach

"It's not really important that I'm still here," said Castello. The coach then turned to Tishman, a sophomore, who was at his side, "But what matters is that boys like this keep coming along year after year."

"We never let up," said Al Peredo, the N.Y.U. assistant fencing coach. "We just ran away from the rest of the field."

The Violets rolled up 71 points, 8 more than Columbia. The University of Pennsylvania, the defending champion, was third with 62 points and Navy placed fourth with 55.

Bruce Soriano of Columbia took the saber crown with a 21-2 record in the final two rounds of competition, and John Nadas of Massachusetts Institute of Technology won the épée title, beating Wayne Krause by one bout.

The N. C. A. A. presented four awards. They went to Louis Bankuti (Columbia), coach of the year; Guy Pommares, (M.I.T.), épée fencer of the year; Bert Freeman (Navy), foilsman of the year, and Soriano (Columbia) saber fencer of the year.
