

N.Y.U. Is Leading N.C.A.A. Fencing With Round to Go

COLORADO SPRINGS, March 19—New York University led by George Szünyogh, its undefeated épée star, took a 2-point lead over the University of Detroit after today's second round of the National Collegiate fencing championships at the Air Force Academy.

The final round of the three-day meet will be held tomorrow.

N.Y.U., seeking its ninth N.C.A.A. crown, has 45 points and Detroit 43. Columbia is third with 42 points and Notre Dame has 40.

Szünyogh, a 21-year-old sophomore from Budapest, captured all 12 of his épée bouts. The only other fencer to compile a 12-0 won-lost record was Bruce Soriano of Columbia, the defending saber champion.
