

# COLUMBIA, N.Y.U. GAIN IN FENCING

Each School Qualifies Three  
for N.C.A.A.'s 2d Round

CHICAGO, March 23 — Columbia and New York University, which tied for the team championship last year, each advanced all three of their fencers into tomorrow's second round of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's fencing championship. The three-day meet is being held at the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle.

Seventy-two fencers, 24 in each of the three weapons—epee, foil and saber—are qualified for tomorrow's round, which begins a two-day round robin final in each division.

Qualifying for the Lions were Bruce Soriano in saber and Gary Peper in foil, who had 9-0 won-lost records each today, and Larry Kramer in epee, who had a 7-2 record.

Soriano, a senior from Newark, N. J., is seeking to become the first fencer in the 28-year history of the N.C.A.A. meet to win three successive individual weapons titles.

N.Y.U. was led by Marty Lang in foil, who posted a 9-0 record; the defending epee champion, George Szunyogh, who had an 8-1 record, and Jeff Tishman, who was 8-1 in saber.

The Violets are trying to become the first school to capture three straight team titles.

In addition to Columbia and N.Y.U., Detroit, Harvard, Illi-

nois, Navy, Notre Dame, Pennsylvania, Princeton, Wayne State and North Carolina qualified three fencers each for tomorrow.

In addition to N.Y.U. and Columbia, other schools to qualify three fencers each were Detroit, Harvard, Illinois, Notre Dame, Pennsylvania, Princeton, Wayne State, North Carolina and Army.
