

# Championship History

The National Collegiate Fencing Championships were established in 1941 as one of the regular Championship events conducted by the NCAA.

This action resulted from a survey conducted by the NCAA Fencing Rules Committee to determine the interest in collegiate fencing and the possibilities of conducting a national championship event in the sport.

The first Championships were held March 29, 1941, at Ohio State University, with a total of 19 colleges and universities and 76 individual contestants entered.

The Championships have been held annually with the exception of the war years, 1943-46, and nine institutions have been able to win outright or share team titles during the 10 years of the tournament. Sixteen institutions have shared the 30 individual championships awarded over that span.

The Fencing Championships are conducted under the direction of the five-man NCAA Fencing Rules Committee composed of:

#### **Illinois Memorial Trophy Winners**

The Illinois Memorial Trophy is awarded to the "Fencer of the Year" selected annually from participants in the National Collegiate Championships. The Trophy is awarded on the basis of sportsmanship and conduct on the strip, attitude and dress, and past performances in the Championships and in over-all intercollegiate competition. Three men are nominated in each weapon classification by participants. Final balloting is completed by a special committee composed of fencing coaches. The first award was made in 1951.

Only two persons have been able to repeat as individual champions in the National Collegiate Fencing Championships. Alex Treves, Rutgers University, won the saber event in 1949 and 1950 and Robert Nielsen, Columbia University, won the foil in 1950 and 1951.



Return of the 1954 National Collegiate Fencing Championships to the University of Chicago marked the first time that the event has been held at an institution more than once. Chicago was host in 1947. The other eight Championships have been held on different campuses.



Eastern institutions dominated the team race of the National Collegiate Fencing Championships with resumption of the Championships following World War II. Northwestern and Ohio State Universities won the first two team championships before war forced cancellation of the event, but the East has won the eight team titles awarded since 1947.



N.Y.U.'s Abraham Balk is the only fencer to win two National Collegiate individual titles in a single year—and likely will hold that distinction until the rules for the Championships are changed. Balk won the foil and epee events in the 1947 National Collegiate Fencing Championships. Two years later, the rules were altered to limit participants to competition in one weapon only.
